






ACCESSIBLE VIEWPOINT - COL DEI ROSSI/COL DI ROSC

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	fossil evidence of the organisms which were instrumental in their formation around 250 million years ago. The sequence of rocks illustrates the resurgence and evolution of life following the greatest extinction event ever recorded in the history of geology that occurred between the Permian and Triassic eras and led to the disappearance of more than 90 % of living species. The interaction between the atolls and the coral reefs of the Triassic and the powerful volcanic eruptions which were a common occurrence in those distant times are clearly and spectacularly visible here. The lack of tectonic deformation, the impressive outcrops, the thick layers of accumulated sediment and the extensive lateral continuity of these mountains reveal the history of the Earth like in a giant rock book and allow us to physically explore the ancient geography of those seas and islands. description of the route	The accessible viewpoint of Col dei Rossi lies at an altitude of 2377 metres and offers an unparalleled view of the mighty Marmolada and the glacier on its north face. The <i>Viel dal Pan</i> crosses the summit of Col dei Rossi, an ancient "bread path" which connects the Pordoi Pass with the Fedaia Pass and was used in Medieval times onwards to trade flour between the Fassa Valley and the Agordino area. It is one of the most famous and scenic hikes in the Dolomites and runs halfway up the ridge, through the lush meadows which carpet the volcanic and sedimentary coverings. Col dei Rossi is accessed directly from Alba near Canazei by the ski lift (fully accessible and with a single section). The valley station has a large car park with reserved spaces. When you get to the summit, the vast plateau around the uphill station allows you to fully appreciate the views in the open air. Just a short distance from the station (approx. 430 m with an incline of 9%) along a downhill path, you get to the Belvedere mountain hut, the nearest place which serves food. From here you can follow the <i>Viel dal Pan</i> which leads to the Fredarola mountain hut along a lovely, almost flat path (average incline of 7%). Col dei Rossi is one of the most panoramic places in the valley, with visible evidence of the coverings of volcanic and sedimentary rock associated with the Dolomite formations that have made these mountains so famous throughout

recommended period	From June to September and from December to April (opening times and

recommended gear	Wear layers, warm clothes and comfortable boots. It is important to take something to eat and drink along the way, sunscreen, a change of clothes should it rain and a hat.
recommended equipment	Outside the uphill station, the disembarkation area and the paths to the mountain huts are untarmacked and the terrain is packed and even. Hiking pushchairs and electric assist wheelchairs suitable for outdoor excursions are therefore recommended, with tyres with deep treads and off-road wheels.
recommendations	Always travel with others, so they can help you deal with any difficulties you may encounter. In bad weather, contact the cableway before setting out to make sure it is open (e.g. if there is strong wind): tel. (+39) 0462 608811.
